

Visit from a Student Nurse

A few years ago, Camosun College had a program for their student nurses sending them out to the community to pair with patients who had a chronic health problem such as kidney failure. The student gained a practical knowledge of the disease and how the patient was coping with it.

Val Cousineau, at Hillside Commmunity Dialysis Facility, asked if I would like to take part in the program. I agreed and soon I was paired with two lovely young student nurses who made three visits to my home. I very much enjoyed their visits because they were so eager to learn all they could about kidney disease and dialysis.

I took part in the program for four years until it was suddenly suspended for reasons unknown to me.

The last two students who came to my home were exceptionally enjoyable. Maybe it was because I had just started home dialysis and they were so enthused, especially when I showed them the dialysis machine, the dialyzer and how it cleaned my blood. One of the students was especially enthused and couldn't learn enough about dialysis. I suggested if she was still interested after graduation maybe she could look into specializing as a dialysis nurse.

I never met any of the students after their last visit until this year when I had to dialyze at the Renal Unit in October. When I approached the bed assigned to me there was a lovely young nurse with the biggest smile on her face. She told me her name and we talked for a few minutes until I said to her, "You look familiar." She said, "Yes, I was a student nurse who came to your home about four years ago and I want you to know that it was because of you that I am now a renal nurse."

She said she was so taken with dialysis and kidney failure and how I was coping so well and my great attitude that she started taking extra courses on renal failure. Because she had taken these courses she was able to get her degree in nursing and start working as a renal nurse shortly after graduating.

I couldn't help but smile to myself thinking that four years ago she was a young student nurse visiting me in my home and now she was a renal nurse and I was her patient.

The experience, as you can see, has been rewarding for both of us!

BLUEBERRY PEACH CRISP

from Cooking for David: A Culinary Dialysis Cookbook by Sara Colman RD, CDE and Dorothy

Gordon BS, RN Portions: 10

Serving size: 1/10 recipe

Ingredients

7 fresh peaches or 4 cups canned peach slices, drained 1/2 cup blueberries (fresh or frozen; substitute

blackberries if desired)

cooking spray

1/4 cup white sugar

1 tablespoon lemon juice

3/4 cup all-purpose flour

3/4 cup packed brown sugar

1/2 cup margarine

Preparation

Pit and slice peaches into 3/4" slices.

Spray a 12" x 12" baking dish with cooking spray. Arrange peach slices and blueberries (or blackberries) in dish

Sprinkle sugar and lemon juice over the fruit.

Mix the flour and brown sugar in a bowl. Using two knives or a pastry blender, cut the margarine into the flour and sugar mixture until it is crumbly. Sprinkle crumbs over the fruit.

Bake at 375° F for 45 minutes or longer until the fruit is soft and crumbs are browned.

Serve warm or at room temperature.

Have you been diagnosed with cancer, end-stage renal disease, or HIV+ status and are at least 12 months past diagnosis?

Would you be willing to share your experience of living with one of these illnesses?

If you answered "yes" to both of these questions:

We are interested in speaking with you about the possibility of participating in a study being conducted by faculty members from the University of Victoria, School of Nursing.

The purpose of this study is:

To gain an understanding of the experiences of living with the uncertainty of illness. Further, we wish to explore people's stories of living with illness and how these experiences shift over time.

You will be asked to:

- Participate in up to 3 interviews over 14 months
- Each interview will be tape recorded and last 60-90 minutes
- Engage in a conversation with a researcher to learn about your experiences.

An honorarium worth \$50 will be provided at the end of the study.

The interviews will be arranged at a time and location convenient for you within Greater Victoria.
